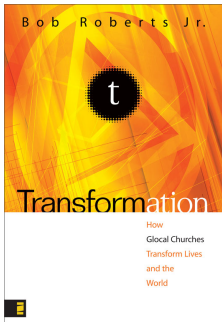
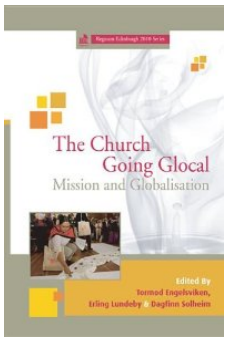

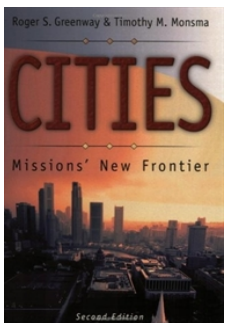
Transformation: How Glocal Churches Transform Lives and the World.

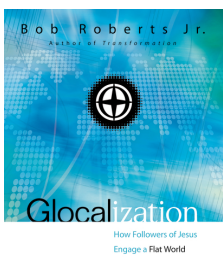
The Church Going Glocal: Mission and Globalization.

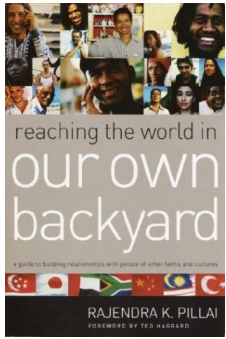
Cities: Missions' New Frontier

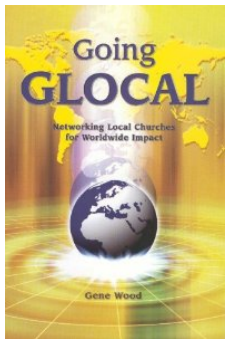
Glocalization: How Followers of Jesus Engage a Flat World.

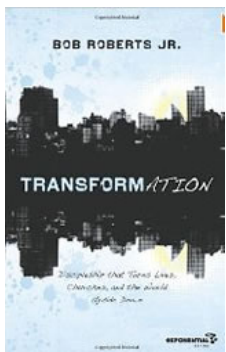
Reaching the World in Our Own Backyard: A guide to building relationships with people of other faiths and cultures.

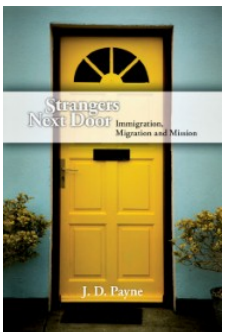
Going Glocal: Networking Local Churches for Worldwide Impact.

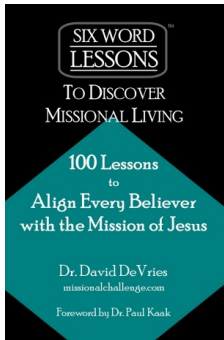
Transformation: Discipleship that turns lives, churches, and the world upside down.

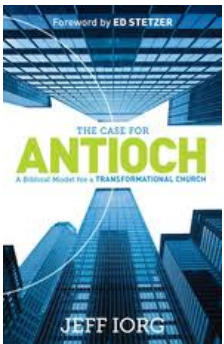
Strangers Next Door: Immigration, Migration and Mission.
