How Jesus Made Disciples Differing From Rabbis?

A.	Centered Discipleship: Rabbis trained their disciples in the, while Jesus' discipleship was based on (Matt. 28:20: Lk. 9:23)
В.	Journey and Commitment: Rabbis required a commitment, but Jesus called his disciples to and surrender of their lives. (Mk. 1:17)
C.	Discipleship: Rabbis treated their disciples as (think "wax on, wax off"). Jesus, on the other hand, treated his disciples as : "You are my friends if you do what I command. I no longer call you servants, for the servant does not know what his master is doing; but I have called you friends, for all that I have heard from my Father I have made known to you."" (Jn.15:14-15).
D.	Initiative: Rabbis were by their potential disciples, and then it was up to the rabbi to say yes or no. Jesus, on the other hand, He Himself his disciples: "You did not choose me, but I chose you" (Jn.15:16a; Mk. 3:13)
E.	Discipleship: Rabbis focused on knowledge so that their disciples could eventually teach others in the Jewish religion, yet Jesus called his disciples to actually something: "Iappointed you to go and bear fruit –fruit that will last" (Jn.15:16b). "Teaching them to observe all that I commanded you" (Matt. 28:20)
F.	Discipleship: Rabbis used a approach to discipleship, but Jesus' method involved discipleship & accountability (Mk.10:42-45)
G.	Discipleship (Everyday, Everywhere, and Everyone): Rabbis focused on a and centered discipleship. Jesus' style of discipleship required more than just attending a weekend church service and showing up for a once-a-week small group – it plays out in our lives. It happens in your quiet time, work time, family time, and play time – every time of every day.
H.	Discipleship: Rabbis' teaching was accommodated by the and while Jesus' teaching was and challenged the (Matt 5:1-7:29; John 6; Mk. 10:17-31 (Jesus and the young rich man)
